News on tenant action in Montreal's low-rent housing

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A New Boost for Sector Committees and the CCR

Did you know that the roles and meetings of the Sector Committees (SC) have been under review for the past year? The goal was to improve the operations of this forum, which includes employees of the Office municipal d'habitation de Montréal (OMHM) and tenant representatives. Last fall, after a number of surveys and discussions, the SC tabled a report proposing a series of possible courses. Nathalie Morin, director for the promotion of social development and consultation, told us about the next step.

Discussions rather than presentations

"We will use new methods (room lay-out, facilitation and workshops) to liven-up the meetings in order to promote discussion and joint work." Keeping in mind that the goal is to improve tenant services, the Office and tenants will develop new tools (dashboard, list of shared problems and summaries). "The new practices will be put to the test and if the results are positive, they will be made permanent."

On the CCR side

The Comité consultatif des résidants (CCR or Advisory Committee of Tenants) also completed its overview in the fall of 2014, a process launched with the help of the Office and Université de Sherbrooke researchers in late 2013. The effort produced five recommendations (see insert). The Committee began discussions to decide what actions were needed to represent low-rent housing tenants in Montreal even more effectively.

Five recommendations to the CCR

- Improve its communications
- Ensure it remains representative
- · Get closer to its grassroots
- · Improve its operations
- · Obtain more support from the OMHM and the Fédération des locataires de HLM du Québec



Time to Pitch In!

We hear a lot of talk these days about austerity. How will it affect health and social services, agencies that assist members of the public? In these uncertain times, the reason for having tenant associations becomes all the clearer. As tenants living onsite, you are ideally placed to be on the look-out for vulnerable individuals. Without trying to fill the shoes of social workers, low-rent housing tenants can help each other and watch out for one another.

At the end of winter, the associations also received their annual subsidy. Spring is therefore a good time for tenant consultations. Survey tenants to find out what activities interest them and to get the helping hand you

need. Ask residents to contribute their talents and collaborate on projects in your building. It's a chance for them to get to know one another and feel less isolated. Not only will you create a positive atmosphere in your low-rent housing, you will also make it easier to support vulnerable individuals.

If you need guidance in managing your association, keep in mind that your CCR has worked with the Fédération des locataires de HLM du Québec and the OMHM to develop a new version of the guide entitled *Ensemble pour agir*. This publication contains all of the information needed to start and manage a tenants' association. The new edition should be ready soon and available for downloading at www.flhlmq.com. Neighbours from Five Continents

One Association Spruces up its Neighbourhood

When Yisppsy Montero moved into the Papineau low-rent housing for families on Wolfe Street in Ville-Marie she was disappointed in her surroundings. "There were garbage cans on the sidewalks, no green space, nothing but asphalt," she reminisced. She contacted Éco-quartier and after various meetings, she met with another tenant, Catherine Obregon, and the chairperson of the next-door housing association and member of the Comité consultatif des résidants (CCR), Richard Fitzgerald. He

was the one who encouraged them to establish their tenant association to get funding from the OMHM. He also offered them his support for their efforts.

In a family housing project divided into separate units with no common area, it can be difficult to gather tenants together. With the help of Tandem Ville-Marie and the support of the OMHM, Ms. Montero and Ms. Obregon raised awareness among other tenants and held a founding meeting last November 14. "We have to take charge of our quality of life and our safety," said Yisppsy Montero, underscoring that little by little, "team work could change the look of our housing." The new committee, with five members, will begin restoring some greenery to Wolfe Street and its vicinity this spring.

Ten Tenants Survey their Housing Environment

Last fall, ten residents of Habitations Séguin set out on a photographic survey of Pointe-aux-Trembles to capture images of things that affect their well-being. As part of an action research by UQAM researchers, they formed a true collective for improving their living environment. Their photos featured the support found within community groups, the mutual help that exists among tenants and the pride taken in living in attractive buildings. However, it also revealed the absence of pedestrian walkways to the park and the difficulty of accessing certain services.

Lucie Cayouette participated in the study. In her opinion, it put an end to her isolation. "I met nine people in the building through this activity. Now I'm a member of the provisional tenant committee that is in the process of founding our association." The project also helped her get to know her surroundings better: "Even though I've lived in the neighbourhood for nine years, the research introduced me to the nature park, and now I go there a lot," she added.

To allow the entire neighbourhood to enjoy the experience, an exhibition of the most striking photos was organized at the Pointe-aux-Trembles Maison de la culture. "The launch was attended by the Mayor of the borough, Chantal Rouleau, the Executive Director of the OMHM, Denis Quirion, community groups and our families. We were extremely proud," said Ms. Cayouette, who added "after that, many building tenants went to see the exhibition too."

Meeting at the crossroads

Seeking ways for different cultures and generations to live together

Being a Good Neighbour Saves Lives!

When the tenants of a low-rent housing project get to know one another and start talking, a sense of harmony settles in. This is what happened at Habitations Lafond and it saved Liliane Dussault, the person in charge of volunteers for the project *A Vigilant Volunteer Is Watching Over You.*

Ms. Dussault told us that she was initially drawn to the project "because it's important that seniors feel safe." She joined with Rose Duquette, another volunteer, in making her daily rounds.

One night, she wasn't feeling well. She immediately called Rose for help, then 911, and fainted. Rose arrived just in time to ask for emergency services. By the time the ambulance arrived, Ms. Dussault's heart had stopped. She was resuscitated in the ambulance and her life was saved at the hospital. But as far as Ms. Dussault is concerned, Rose's fast response is the reason she is alive today. A few seconds more and it would have been too late.

After Ms. Dussault's accident, Rose Duquette continued her "watchful" volunteer work with another tenant's help. "I like helping other people. It takes my mind off things," she said simply. She also remembered that another tenant at Habitations Lafond was saved thanks to *A Vigilant Volunteer Is Watching Over You*. Both women encourage elderly residents to participate in the project. It's a simple way to feel safe.
